After lunch, President Robinson introduced the speaker, Jerald Hurwitz, who talked about the Battle of Ft Griswold near Groton, New London, Connecticut. This battle was led by Benedict Arnold on 6 September 1781, after he switched sides and joined the British Army as a Brigadier General. This was a very tragic battle for the American patriots and led to the deaths of several men due to a grave misunderstanding after the American flag was shot down and then

replaced. The British saw those actions as a deception since the lowering of a flag normally meant the fort was giving itself up. As a result, the British showed no mercy for the defenders when they overtook the fort. This battle occurred shortly before the Battle of Yorktown, and as a result, turned out to be an inconsequential victory for the British in the Revolutionary War.

The Chapter coffers were enriched by \$18 from the 50/50 drawing.


The meeting was adjourned at approximately 1:45pm.

Also, please understand this is a **volunteer** activity; you will not be reimbursed for any travel, meal or lodging expenses.

Revolutionary History Notes (by Bob Yarnell):

Last month I discussed Rochambeau. This month we'll finish up the French with a discussion of de Grasse and leave the topic of Lafayette's activities after the war for next year.

Francois Joseph Paul de Grasse is remembered by Americans for commanding the French fleet that defeated the British fleet at the Battle of the Capes in Sept 1781, thus sealing the fate of Gen. Cornwallis and his army.

Born in 1722, he joined the French Navy in 1739 at the age of seventeen. He served in

India during the Seven Years War, being stationed mostly in Calcutta.

Returning to France with the outbreak of the American War for Independence, he commanded a ship in an indecisive battle off the coast of Brittany in 1778. The French government then ordered him to the Caribbean where he joined the French Fleet commanded by Comte d'Estaing.

When planning the campaign for 1781, Washington and Rochambeau asked de Grasse which he preferred, to sail north to New York and assist in a battle there or go to the Chesapeake. De Grasse insisted on the Chesapeake. He told them sailing in and around New York harbor was too treacherous, and that it would take him too far from his supply base.

De Grasse arrived in the Chesapeake at the beginning of September and was unloading supplies and men. He was not aware that a British fleet under command of Adm. Graves had arrived off the Chesapeake. Likewise, Graves did not know the French had arrived. They both, almost simultaneously, learned of the presence of the other. Several historians have noted that this element of surprise seemed to have confused both admirals.

As I detailed in the October 2020 column, the outcome of the battle was more the British losing it due to poor decision making on Graves part, than the French winning. De Grasse commanded the winning fleet, but did little to influence the battle, and in fact, made several decisions that could have lost it.

Following the surrender of Cornwallis, de Grasse headed back to his base in the Caribbean. The following spring, in April 1782, deGrasse's squadron fought a battle with a British squadron between the islands of Guadeloupe and Dominica. The British won a resounding victory. While some French ships escaped, the British forced several, including de Grasse's flagship, to surrender. As with the battle at the Chesapeake, de Grasse's decision making and handling of his ships came into question as did his courage. After he struck his colors, the British boarded his ship to accept his surrender. Every officer on board had been either killed or wounded in the battle. except deGrasse.

Recriminations flew in the aftermath of the battle as the French government tried to assess what went wrong and who was at fault: de Grasse, individual ship captains or both. A court of inquiry met in 1783 and issued its verdict in 1784. The court acquitted most of the officers, including de Grasse. De Grasse died just four years later.

JROTC Medal Presentations:

Each of you has the opportunity to make presentations of the SAR JROTC Award to the recipients at the various High School JROTC programs which the Tampa Chapter supports. This is a very rewarding experience; it will help renew your faith in the youth of our nation. There is very little

you would have to do other than attend the program. Terry Doan will mail the awards to the school and they will prepare them; you would just sit in the designated area with the other presenters and, when they announce the award, you would move up and hand the award to the cadet. (You will need to pause to allow family members to take pictures.) You would then return to your seat and depart at the end of the ceremony; these generally last around an hour. We usually wear a navy blazer and khaki pants. Some wear their tri-corn hat but that is not required; some other presenters wear organization polo shirts.
