Kathy Robinson received the Lydia Darragh Medal for her significant service to the President during his term.



American Revolution Notes:

Upper Hudson Valley & Quebec 1759-1763

Last month we discussed the "toing" and "fro-ing" of the British and French forces in the upper Hudson River valley. By the end of 1758 the British had positioned themselves to launch a new campaign in 1759.

In London, William Pitt the Younger had taken command of the British war efforts. He planned a two-pronged attack against the French. First, he directed General Amherst to renew the British offensive against the forts on Lake George and Lake Champlain. He then gave General Wolfe command of the combined naval and land forces assigned to go up the St Lawrence River and capture Quebec.

Because the British had been so successful in severing the French

supply lines in 1758, the French forts on the lakes could not be held. The overall French commander in North America, General Montcalm, ordered their garrisons to evacuate the forts and retreat to Quebec or Montreal. Thus, Fort Ticonderoga and Fort Niagara fell to the British with little effort required. The British occupied Ticonderoga in June 1759 and Niagara in July 1759. With the Upper Hudson Valley clear of French troops, Amherst went into winter quarters to plan the assault on Montreal in the spring of 1760.

Wolfe planned his assault up the St Lawrence to take Quebec from the fortress of Louisburg on Nova Scotia, which the British had captured the previous year. Capturing Quebec would not be easy. The fortress stood on the bluffs overlooking the river. It would be necessary to scale the bluffs before any attack could be launched. General Wolfe's flotilla arrived off Quebec in late July. He first tried to land downriver from the city. That didn't work and he continued searching for a suitable place to land. Finally in early September, the British found a suitable place upriver from the city. On Sept 12, Lt. Col. William Howe¹

led an assault that secured a beachhead and a place from which the British soldiers could follow a narrow path up the cliff.

On the evening of Sept 12, while the men in his army began to scale the cliff, Wolfe met with his senior officers and recited to them, **Elegy Written in a Country Churchyard** by Thomas Gray. When he had finished, he said to them, "Gentlemen, I would rather have written that poem than take Quebec tomorrow."²

On the morning of Sept. 13th, General Montcalm woke to the sight of the British army lined up on the plain outside the walls of Quebec. Rather than withstand a siege which he knew the city could not survive, Montcalm led his troops out to face the British. He had fewer regular troops than Wolfe and his militia could not be counted on. Nevertheless. Montcalm ordered an assault on the British lines. His militia began firing when well out of range and when the distance closed and the British returned fire, the French broke and ran. When the smoke cleared Montcalm and Wolfe both lay dead on the field. General

Wolfe was shot three times, with the third wound proving to be fatal.

The early American historian Francis Parkman described his death. A soldier nearby said: "They run, see how they run."

Wolfe, on the ground, opened his eyes and asked: "Who runs?" "The French", came the reply.

Wolfe gave several orders, then turned on his side and said "Now, God be praised, I will die in peace," and died. It is worth wondering if in his dying moments Wolfe recited to himself his favorite line from the Elegy, which may be the line most familiar to you. "The paths of glory lead but to the grave."

In the spring of 1760, a French force from Montreal laid siege to Quebec but a British relief force arrived forcing the French to retreat. With the threat eliminated, Amherst began his long-anticipated march to Montreal. By September 6th he had surrounded Montreal and prepared to lay siege to the city. The French commander planned to fight to the end, but the civilian population and French

Governor persuaded him to surrender.

With the fall of Montreal on September 7th, the North American phase of the Seven Year's War came to an end and the conflict we know better as the French and Indian War ended.
