
Our Color Guard was also asked to post the Colors at the DeSoto DAR Chapter's Christmas luncheon on December 13th at the Tampa Yacht Club.

Revolutionary History Notes (by Bob Yarnell)

The French and Indian War in the Upper Hudson Valley.

As we did when we looked at the war in Western Pennsylvania, we'll first go through a brief geography overview. The Hudson River and adjacent waterways provided both sides with an avenue of advance upon the other. The British could use the Hudson, Lake George and Lake Champlain to launch expeditions north to Montreal and it could allow the French a straight shot at Albany.

Leaving Albany and heading north, the first feature of importance is Lake George. Continuing north, you encounter the vast expanse that is Lake Champlain. Whoever controlled the lakes would control the upper Hudson Valley.

Recognizing this, the British began building Ft. William Henry in 1755 near the southern end of Lake George. The French sent an expedition to stop construction of the fort. On Sept 8, 1755, what is now known as the Battle of Lake George took place. The French attacked in the morning, pushing the British and colonial troops back. By midday the British line had stabilized and repulsed a French attack. In the afternoon and following day, British forces swept the French from the area thus clearing the

way to finish the construction of Ft. William Henry.

A year later, in Aug. 1756, another French expedition, under the new commander of French forces in North America, Gen. Montcalm, captured Ft. Oswego, located at the northern end of Lake Ontario and Ft. Niagara located between Lake Erie and Lake Ontario.

Buoyed by his success, Montcalm launched an attack on Ft. William Henry in March 1757, but the British successfully defended the position. Not to be deterred, Montcalm launched a siege operation against Ft. William Henry in Aug. 1757. Within days the Fort's walls had been breached and the British had suffered many casualties, including many camp followers. Montcalm sent a flag of truce and negotiations for the surrender of the Fort and offered generous terms which the British Commander Col. Munro accepted. The British evacuated to Ft. Edwards, 14 miles east. The French destroyed what remained of Ft. Henry and moved to Ft. Ticonderoga at the southern end of Lake Champlain. *

In July 1758, the British launched a large-scale assault on the French in Ft. Ticonderoga. The British commander, Gen. Abercrombie, has been generously described as negligent and incompetent. The British attack failed miserably.

However, as was the case on the Ohio frontier, things changed in England's

favor later in the summer of 1758. Changes in leadership and strategic thinking led to British successes. First, the British captured Ft. Frontenac located at the northeast tip of Lake Ontario where the lake drains into the St. Lawrence. As you'll recall from our discussion of war on the Ohio frontier, this effectively severed all communication and supply lines to French forces in Pennsylvania and Ohio, as well as opening a possible new axis of advance on Montreal, along the St Lawrence.

Second, in October 1758, England secured a peace treaty with the Iroquois, Shawnee and Delaware Indians, thus effectively taking them out of the war. Knowing that the French in upper New York now had no native allies, the British made plans for a new assault on the Upper Hudson and the lakes in 1759.

We'll turn our attention to that next month.

*The "massacre" at Ft. William Henry.

There is still considerable controversy over what happened after Montcalm and Munro signed the surrender and the British evacuated Ft. William Henry. What can be verified is that after the British evacuated, France's native American allies went into the fort, looted it and killed some wounded British soldiers under the protection of French doctors.

What is also probable, perhaps closer to truth than fiction, is that Native Americans attacked stragglers near the end of the British column and looted some supply wagons.

What is closer to fiction than truth is the way James Fenimore Cooper described the massacre of British troops in column on the way to Ft. Edwards in his book "The Last of the Mohicans."

What is not true is the way it is depicted in the movie "Last of the Mohicans" starring Daniel Day-Lewis. The Native Americans did not ambush the main British column and massacre the soldiers.

So, what can we say about the activities of the Native Americans after the surrender? Looting/burning the fort—yes. Killing remaining British wounded—yes.

Looting wagons at the end of the British column—more probable than not.

Mostly capturing, with minimal killing, camp followers and stragglers at the end of the column—more probable than not.

Ambushing and massacring British soldiers at the front of the column—no.

Personal note. Over the years while attending various conferences, seminars etc. I have met some interesting people. One was a middle school history teacher from Illinois who moonlighted in the summer as an extra in movies needing

people with authentic uniforms who knew enough to be "in character." He was contacted by the producer of the "Last of the Mohicans" and asked if he would be a British soldier in the ambush massacre scenes. He said. "sure." In addition to whatever the regular daily pay was, the "British" extras got an additional \$50.00 if they were "killed" on film and that footage made it into the end product. He told me he managed to get "killed" five times that day on film, three of which made it into the final film. He also told me not everyone, British or Native American, stayed strictly on script. At the end of day there were quite a few bumps, bruises, sprained ankles and several broken arms, legs, and collar bones. He credited his experience to limiting his injuries to just some bruised ribs.
