March Historical Notes... by Bob Yarnell

This month, we ask a question sometimes in the mind of history students. "So what? Why do we consider the French and Indian war to be so important?"

During my teaching career, when we finished a unit on any event or discussed a significant person, I would tell the students to figure out if something is important by asking

- \Rightarrow Is he/she/it representative of the time and place?
- ⇒ Was it deemed significant at the time?
- ⇒ Is it deemed significant now? Why or why not?
- ⇒ Did it have far-reaching consequences?

Before answering those questions about the French & Indian War there is another question that needs answered. Are the results of this war in any way connected to the reasons the war started?

No. George Washington found himself in the Pennsylvania wilderness in 1754 attempting to guarantee access to the interior for Virginia and Pennsylvania settlers and to open up the fur trade to English traders. As a result of the war Britain acquired an empire and France lost most of its territory in the western hemisphere. And, because of the various deals and treaties with the Natives, England prevented/prohibited the English colonists from settling or trading west of the Appalachians. In other words, the original reason for the outbreak of hostilities had no relationship to its results.

Was it deemed significant at the time. Yes, but not immediately. It took a few years for the impact to be felt. By 1768, people in England and the colonies realized the importance of the results of the war.

England acquiring an empire almost by accident, not by purposeful intent, resulted in the Government of Great Britain having to administer an empire and garrison an empire. The result being that Britain had to somehow pay to administer and garrison their newly won empire in addition to paying off the debt England had incurred to fight the war.

For the colonist, the removal of the French

threat brought relief and opportunity. Granted England tried to prevent migration beyond the Appalachians, but never-the-less the opportunity for land and riches beckoned.

Once all these consequences of the war became apparent, the answer to was it deemed significant at the times is a "yes".

Is it deemed significant now? Absolutely, mostly due to the far-reaching consequences of the results. England's need for money resulted in legislative overreach by Parliament. British cabinet ministers and bureaucrats had no experience in governing an empire that stretched to North America, India, the Caribbean, Gibraltar and the Mediterranean.

The legislative overreach resulted in push back from the English colonies. Inexperience, lack of creativity, and, not to be too unkind, incompetence on the part of the British ministry contributed to disastrous policies and the colonial pushback.

Would the colonies have sought separation eventually from their mother country without the war? Maybe.

When that separation came, if it did, would it have occurred differently? Probably.

But we can be sure that the separation of the colonies from England happened as it did, instead of some other way, in large part due to the results of the French and Indian War.

¹A quick more modern example. The US went to war with Germany in 1941 to defeat Nazism and free Europe, not to hand eastern Europe to Soviet Communism. Rarely in history do results of wars dovetail nicely with the purposes and goals for the war.

² The previous three paragraphs set forth a summary of the "Imperial School" theory for the colonies breaking with England. 


