
Chaplain's Notes:

After authoring several local history books, he transitioned to historical romance novels when he moved to Florida, year-round, in 2015.


His first novel, a Civil War love story, was inspired by his wife, Christine. She is an expert genealogist and discovered that Mark's ancestors fought in the Civil War. Mark's ancestors also fought in the American Revolutionary War and the War of 1812. The result was an award-winning trilogy on love and war that has garnered state, national, and international recognition.

Most recently, Mark published a love story involving the mysterious destruction of the USS Maine, which led to the Spanish American War. The

novel made headlines for its ground-breaking research into who and what caused the explosion. In September of last year, Barie published the fifth novel in his series on love and war, "For King, Country, and Love", a riveting World War I love story about a nurse and her many patients.

Barie is an accomplished public speaker, making dozens of presentations each year, on America's earliest wars, to historical societies, service organizations, and genealogical groups across the State of Florida.


Tom McMillan

Application / Supplemental Formatting Notes ...

For this month, I would like to highlight an item that has popped up when I've tried to save some time in checking on previously filed applications on parents / grandparents, etc, to save some time in re-typing in some of the same information.

As just a suggestion, when it comes to being re-married / 2nd marriages and all, unless you have children to 2nd, 3rd, etc marriages, you MAY just want to list the mother of the children you have that may follow in your footsteps as members of the SAR. Now I'm not saying you ca not list your most current spouse, but for lineage purposes, the biological parents are what is going to be needed, no matter whether you like the mother of your children any more or not. (Please see this with a little bit of humor.) Now if you have had more than one spouse with children to each of them, then list whichever you may want. For SAR purposes, you may want to list the spouse that produced any male heirs as that could be more immediately applicable (i.e. you had a boy with one spouse; and a girl with a different spouse); but obviously, the daughter may have male heirs down Personal preferences, but just the road too. thoughts to consider. Remember, for first marriages, you don't need to list a "1" for first spouses; 2nd, 3rd, etc spouses are listed in parenthesis as "(2)", "(3)", etc in the prefix block. Also, if your spouse had been previously married, you list "Mrs" in the prefix block, and then for the last name, put her maiden name first, a space, and

then her previous married name. Some spouses will revert to their maiden names upon divorce; but widows typically don't. Just understand the format should any of the above circumstances apply to you when filling out your application form. {see below}

The Tampa SAR HRCCG escorted returning veterans and carried the Colors at the 53rd WC Honor Flight. (10 Jun 2025).
















Summer Historical Notes... by Mark Barie

George Washington— The Man Who Could Not Die

George Washington might easily have lost his life on a half-dozen different occasions.

For example, in 1757, he contracted small pox while in Barbados. Unlike like many of his counterparts during the Revolutionary War, he survived to talk about it.

At the battle of Monongahela, during the French and Indian War in July 1775, his escape from death was much more dramatic. Washington's horse was shot out from under him not once but twice. When the battle ended, he also discovered four bullet holes in his coat. He wrote his wife, Martha, and credited "the all-powerful dispensations of Providence" for saving his life.

In June 1776, a member of Washington's body guard plotted the Commander in Chief's assassination. Thomas Hickey conspired with a kitchen worker at Washington's favorite eatery, Frauncis' Tavern in New York City. The plan was to poison a dish of fresh peas, a vegetable which Washington coveted. The owner of the restaurant exposed the plot, Hickey was eventually executed, and the future first president of the United States, escaped unharmed.

Two months later, at the battle of Long Island, Washington's defeated army accomplished the impossible. They escaped certain capture by the British while the enemy lay in wait, just yards away. A sudden and unusual dense fog blanketed the entire area. The Americans marched quietly to the river's edge, muffled the oars on their boats, and slipped away in the dead of night. The British would not discover Washington's absence until the next morning. This miraculous "disappearance" of hundreds of American soldiers allowed Washington's army to regroup and continue their fight for independence. Years later, historians would attribute the unexpected assistance of mother nature to Divine Providence.

On Christmas day, 1776, in the dead of night and with below freezing temperatures, Washington and his troops crossed the Delaware, catching Hessian troops by surprise and inflicting a humiliating defeat on the British Army. Despite the icy river, its dangerous ice flows, and the strong currents, George Washington survived yet another brush with death.

At the battle of Princeton in Jan 1777, Washington once again dared the Prince of Death to strike him down but the devil missed his chance. When a friend of George Washington, General Hugh Mercer, was bayonetted by the British, almost to death, an angry Goerge Washington immediately took command. Washington charged forward astride his magnificent white horse, plunging into a hail storm of cannon fire and musket balls. At one point Washington was 30 yards from the British line. The American troops, awestruck and inspired, surged forward. The British were soundly defeated and, miraculously, Washington emerged from the bloody battle, unscathed. John Fitzgerald, an American officer and eyewitness to Washington's death-defying actions, admitted to pulling pulled his hat over his eyes at one point during combat, convinced that his Commander in Chief would be struck down and killed.

But Washington did not die. Years later, a North American Indian and acknowledged marksman, who shot at Washington more than ten times during the battle at Monongahela, refused to admit that he might simply have missed his target. Instead, he announced that Washington was no doubt protected by the "Great Spirit" and could not die.

George Washington died of course but history suggests that the "Great Spirit" managed to postpone the inevitable until the Father of our country accomplished his very noble cause.

The Florida Society of the Sons of the American Revolution became aware of this amphibious assault sometime ago, further, it was learned that the only known monument to the event is a small plaque in the Bahamas. Subsequently, it was decided it was appropriate to erect a memorial to commemorate this historic event

Pompano Beach was chosen among other reasons as the closest logical location on the US mainland to the actual landing site in the Bahamas. The location currently receives approximately 280,000 visitors annually

A committee was formed to plan, coordinate, raise funds, and erect a fitting monument. The committee has been engaged in these tasks for several months.






