Tampa Mayor Castor Approved a Liberty Tree in Central Tampa

The City of Tampa is covering the total cost of the tree and signage for us to have a Liberty Tree at the Julian B Lane Riverfront Park— across the river from downtown just north of the University of Tampa. We are looking for a summer dedication. Keep an ear peeled for updates to attend!!

**** While the original concept has been funded, more trees are still in the works and are being planned, so donations are still being accepted and wanted. America's 250th Anniversary is not just this year, but continues through 2033 ****

To get us there, we will need donations as the estimated costs that we're trying to lock down is going to be ~ \$3,500 for the tree, marker/bench, more so depending on the marker/bench. As it's looking currently, the "Plan A" is a monument bench at the Veteran's Memorial Park on US Hwy 301 to be set by a tree that we can coordinate as a Liberty Tree commemorating the Nation's 250th anniversary birthday. Inscriptions will be memorialized directly on the granite bench. Our Color Guard will participate along with the SAR, DAR, C.A.R. and Local Scout Troops for the dedication.

The South Shore Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) erected a Liberty Tree and historical marker, May 2 at the neighborhood park at Waterset development, Apollo Beach. The ceremony, witnessed by 45 SAR members and neighbors, featured a flag presentation ceremony by the Tampa SAR Chapter Color Guard, attired in colonial garb.

The event was part of the SAR national initiative to plant 250 trees by July 4, 2026,

in commemoration of the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. The project honors the original Boston Liberty Tree—a Revolutionary-era meeting place for patriots—by creating living, educational tributes in every state.

A Family's History

The Marks Family: A Patriot Legacy

As we approach the 250th anniversary of the American Revolutionary War, the story of the Marks family of Loudoun County, Virginia reflects the layered service that secured American independence.

Rev. John Marks Sr., pastor of Ketocin Baptist Church, embodied the "Patriot Preacher" tradition. In addition to his ministry, he served as an ensign in the Loudoun County Militia and was known for sermons that strongly supported the cause of independence, inspiring many in his congregation, including members of his own family, to take up that cause.

Among them was Captain Isaiah Marks, who served in the Virginia Line of the Continental Army. His service reflects the dynamic nature of the war, as officers were often reassigned through reorganizations of the Virginia regiments. Records indicate that he entered service as a lieutenant and rose to the rank of captain, serving through some of the war's most consequential campaigns. He was wounded at the Battle of Brandywine and is associated with the Virginia forces that endured the difficult winter encampment at Valley Forge, experiences that defined the resilience of the Continental Army.

In addition to his military service, Captain Marks was among those Virginia officers eligible for postwar land grants in Kentucky, part of the Commonwealth's effort to compensate Continental officers for their service. These western lands, opened to settlement in the years following the war, became an enduring part of many Virginia families' legacies. Traditions within the Marks family hold that portions of this land remained connected to the family for generations, reflecting a lasting tie between Revolutionary War service and the early development of Kentucky.

Together, their legacy reflects the foundational role of both local militia service and the Continental Army officer corps in achieving American independence.

George Washington and the Gingerbread Man



Christopher Ludwick arrived in Philadelphia in 1755.

The 35-year-old German native carried with him a “baker’s arsenal” of pots, pans, and gingerbread molds. Ludwick specialized in ornate gingerbread and a host of tasty treats. He opened a high-end bakery in the Letitia Court area of Philadelphia. A little more than a decade later, the skilled artisan had made his fortune. He owned nine houses, a farm in Germantown, more than 123 acres of land out in the countryside, plus a tidy fortune in gold and silver bullion.

He was wealthy but he was also a Patriot. In 1774, the American colonies bristled under Great Britain’s increasingly totalitarian rule and oppressive tax schemes. When the Americans decided to fight back, the gingerbread maker joined the fray. He became a member of the city’s Committee of Correspondence and donated 200 pounds for the defense of Philadelphia. Initially, he worked to clothe the Continental Army. Later, he volunteered to serve in the Pennsylvania Militia, refusing both pay and rations.

When Ludwick learned that some of his colleagues, disgusted with army food were preparing to desert their posts, Ludwick intervened. He compared “the cry of fire in Philadelphia” to which all would respond with buckets, to the “fire of the invading British forces” to which all should respond with guns and bayonets. And he promised them bread. Plenty of it.

He kept his promise and the men remained at their posts. Soon, the news of his largess spread throughout the army. His bread and his good deeds had become legend. On May 3, 1777, the United States Congress, with George Washington’s full support, appointed Ludwick as the Baker General of the United States. He went on to reform and vastly improve the ineffective and corrupt government system of securing and distributing rations to soldiers in the field. The Commander in Chief coordinated his troop movements with the bread maker’s whereabouts to keep the army close to the “reliable food source” that Ludwick had become.

Ludwick also spied for George Washington and on one occasion, erected a bakery for no other reason than to trick the British into believing Washington would station his troops, nearby. Washington headed to Yorktown instead. And when the British were eventually defeated at Yorktown, it was Ludwick who supplied 6000 pounds of bread, to keep the British troops from starving.

Sadly, the war years destroyed Ludwick’s health, both physical and financial. Much of his property had been ruined by the enemy. The rest had been sold to support the American cause. The man’s fortune, most of it spent in support of the American Army, was now depleted. The 61-year-old baker, now blind in one eye, had no choice but to start over. He made a humiliating appeal to Congress for even a partial reimbursement of his losses. They responded with the paltry sum of \$200.

Ludwick returned to Letitia Court, where the “governor of Letitia”, as his neighbors called him, continued to make bread. When he died in 1801, the famous baker had once again accumulated enough wealth to make a series of charitable bequests. He left substantial sums to a half-dozen churches, including an African-American congregation and numerous other contributions to his favorite causes. But it was his \$13,000 contribution to the University of Pennsylvania that got the most attention. The money would be used to educate poor children in the city of Philadelphia.

Today, the Christopher Ludwick Foundation, has more than \$6 million in their trust fund and awards more than \$250,000 to needy children in the city of Philadelphia, each year. So, grab some milk and cookies and make a toast to the gingerbread man that sacrificed everything for his adopted country.

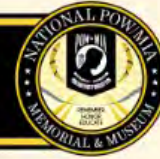

April 29, 2025

Mr. Bean of Florida (for himself, Mr. Webster of Florida, Mr. Carson, Mrs. Luna, Mr. Diaz-Balart, Mr. Buchanan, Mr. Rutherford, and Mr. Scott Franklin of Florida) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Veterans' Affairs, and in addition to the Committee on Natural Resources, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case

for

consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned

A BILL

To designate the POW/MIA Memorial and Museum in Jacksonville, Florida, as the National POW/MIA Memorial and Museum, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

SECTION 1. Short title.

This Act may be cited as the "National POW/MIA Memorial and Museum Act".

SEC. 2. Findings.

Congress finds the following:

- (1) The POW/MIA Memorial and Museum is a civic landmark and cultural institution being built as of the date of the enactment of this Act in Jacksonville, Florida, to honor, connect, inspire, and educate all people about the 142,000 members of the Armed Forces who have been captured as prisoners of war since World War II and the approximately 82,000 members of the Armed Forces who are currently missing in action or unaccounted for since World War II.
- (2) The POW/MIA Memorial and Museum is a unique and comprehensive project developed for the exclusive purpose of honoring former prisoners of war, those who were missing in action, those still missing and unaccounted for, and for providing a venue for families of these men and women to tell their stories.
- (3) The POW/MIA Memorial and Museum will publicize the stories of such individuals, showcase the history of the POW/MIA logo, the history of the Naval Air Station Cecil Field as a master jet base, and will serve as a reflective facility for all.
- (4) The POW/MIA Memorial and Museum will attract and educate a diverse group of people through visitor-centered, interactive, participatory exhibits, and will provide a place for educational programs, special events, and activities connecting all generations.

SEC. 3. National POW/MIA Memorial and Museum.


(a) Designation.—The memorial and museum that is, as of the date of the enactment of this Act, being constructed on an approximately 26-acre area on POW-MIA Memorial Parkway, Jacksonville, Florida, shall be designated as the "National POW/MIA Memorial and Museum".

Charles Thomas Copeland entered the nearer presence of the Lord on May 12th, 2022. He was born October 23rd, 1938, in Chicago, Illinois to Charles Thomas "Tom" Copeland and Mae Walton Finn. He was a loving life partner with Judy. Together, they raised their family, supported each other in all decisions and grew together through all the joys, challenges, and changes they faced. He was involved in the Coast Guard Auxiliary and loved the relationships he built through his amateur radio community spread throughout the world. He was a model, inspiration and foundation for his boys who deeply relied on his wisdom and support in building their own families. He was active in the life of Grace Lutheran Church in Tampa and loved singing in "The Grace Notes", the singing group that he and Judy helped form. He was an incredible friend known for his infectious laugh, engaging stories, and unwavering support.

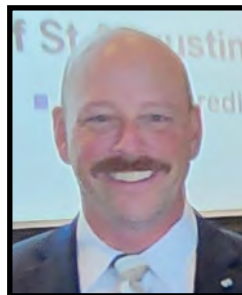

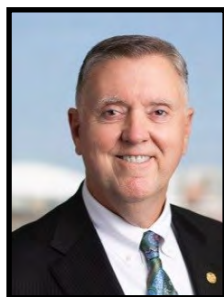
